Introduction

The Bunkyo University Foundation is an academic group with four campuses. The Administrative Foundation Office and the University's Secretarial Department is located at the Hatanodai campus in Tokyo's Shinagawa Ward. There are also three schools attached to the university - a kindergarten, a junior high school and a senior high school. Including the student enrollment in the kindergarten, there are 1,180 students attending these schools.

The Koshigaya campus, located in Koshigaya City, Saitama Prefecture, consists of the Faculty of Education, the Faculty of Human Sciences, the Faculty of Language and Literature, the Graduate School of Human Sciences (Master's & Doctoral program), the Graduate School of Language and Culture (Master's & Doctoral program), the Graduate School of Education, the Special Postgraduate Course and the Foreign Student Department. 5,180 students are studying in the Koshigaya campus.

In the Shonan campus in Chigasaki City, Kanagawa Prefecture, 3,620 students are studying. The campus comprises the Faculty of Information and Communications, the Faculty of International Studies, the Faculty of Health and Nutrition, the Faculty of Business Administration, the Graduate School of Information and Communications (Master's program) and the Graduate School of International Studies (Master's program).

In the Ishikawadai campus in Tokyo's Ota Ward, an elementary school where about 160 students are studying is also attached to Bunkyo University.

The teaching staff of the Bunkyo University Foundation have devoted themselves to providing individual education thus the teachers understand the needs of each and every student at the kindergarten, the elementary school, the junior high school, the senior high school, the university and the graduate schools. In light of the rapid internationalization of Japanese society, the junior high school, the senior high school and the university have made academic affiliation contracts with educational institutions in countries such as China, South Korea, U.S.A., Canada, United Kingdom, Germany, Thailand, Vietnam, Mongolia, Malaysia, Australia and New Zealand. Under these contracts, most of the Bunkyo partner schools and the international institutions have promoted student intercultural exchanges, including exchange programs in which students from Bunkyo and foreign universities study at each other's schools.

The Bunkyo University Foundation has stepped up efforts to deepen relations between its schools and has striven to offer education in a manner that would increase the satisfaction of all students. Graduates of the Bunkyo University Foundation have been playing major roles in various communities and have received high acclaim for their contributions and achievements in society.

Bunkyo University Foundation is resolved to serve the interest of society by providing education aimed at promoting "Empathy for All Humanity," which is the foundation for the global age.

Philosophy

Bunkyo University is guided by the spirit of "Education through Ningen Ai (Empathy for All Humanity)," which implies encouraging love for others and leads to enthusiasm for learning. Under this watchword, Bunkyo University is currently engaged in a complete evaluation of its programs. The reason for this basic reassessment is the rapidly changing role of Japan in the world, and a belief that higher education should take leadership in preparing youth for the opportunities presented in this age of information technology and global exchange. At this early stage in the process of evaluation, internationalization has already begun.

- 1966 Rissho Women's University is founded in Koshigaya City, Saitama Prefecture. The Faculty of Domestic Science is established at the university.
- 1968 Rissho Junior College for Women is renamed Junior College of Rissho Women's University.
- 1969 The Faculty of Education is established at Rissho Women's University.
- 1976 The Faculty of Human Sciences is established at Rissho Women's University. Rissho Women's University is renamed Bunkyo University. The Junior College of Rissho Women's University is renamed Women's College of Bunkyo University.

- 1980 The Faculty of Information and Communications is established at Bunkyo University.
- 1985 The Faculty of Information and Communications and the Women's College of Bunkyo University are transferred to the Shonan campus.
- 1987 The Faculty of Language and Literature is established at Bunkyo University.
- 1990 The Faculty of International Studies is established at Bunkyo University.
- 1992 The Special Postgraduate Course is established at Bunkyo University.
- 1993 Graduate Schools and the Foreign Student Department are established at Bunkyo University.
- 2010 The Faculty of Health and Nutrition is established at Bunkyo University.
- 2014 The Faculty of Business Administration is established at Bunkyo University.

Cultivating the “hearts” of future educators and their teaching techniques

The Faculty of Education was established in 1969 to help train students to work in teaching fields, making Bunkyo University the first private university in Japan to offer specialized courses for teacher training. Nearly 50 years since its establishment, the faculty has produced more than 11,000 professionals teaching in elementary schools, junior high schools, senior high schools and special education schools across Japan. With the excellent achievements shown by its graduates at educational institution across the nation, the Faculty of Education has won high acclaim from various communities as a distinguished training institution for teachers. In the 2003 academic year, the

faculty opened a course for psychoeducation to help train students to become teachers specializing in child psychology ranging from infants to youth. Furthermore, from the 2016 academic year, for the promotion of English education in elementary school, a new English Major was established in the School of Education Course. The Faculty of Education provides students with the educational environment in which their “hearts” as educators are cultivated, teaching techniques sharpened, and dreams of becoming teachers for kindergartens, nursery schools, elementary schools, junior high schools, senior high schools and special education schools are realized.

Faculty of Human Sciences

人間科学部

Explore humans and study them scientifically

The modern world is in the midst of complicated family relations. Neighbors are less reliable and harmonious human relations are less sustainable than in the past. Many people feel it bothersome to build viable relationships with others. In order to tackle these problems, contemporary society needs to develop human resources who can research and comprehend humanity synthetically and profoundly. The Faculty of Human Sciences aims towards a general understanding of humans, focusing on psychology, sociology and lifelong learning with options such as cultural anthropology and social

welfare. We established the Department of Psychology in the spring of 2008, accompanying existing Department of Human Sciences and Clinical Psychology, as a result of our re-evaluation on how our learning of Human Sciences can contribute to resolve those problems facing the people of today. Our three majors under Human Sciences are like “siblings” regarding their history. These relationship enables students to transcend academic barriers and to learn aspects of other fields that ultimately lead to an understanding of adjacent and supplemental academic domains.

Faculty of Language and Literature

文学部

Aimed toward fostering a rich humanity through languages

No advancement in communications technology will change the way humans interact with each other through languages. Speaking, listening, reading and writing will remain important. Believing in the potential of languages during this ever-changing era and exploring issues related to languages will become the first step for people to achieve understanding about themselves, different cultures and different societies. The Faculty of Language and Literature has established four departments to help students acquire foreign language skills and deepen their knowledge and understanding of language-related culture in the East and West while reflecting the reality of the rapidly internationalizing community. The Department of Japanese Language and Literature is designed to teach the Japanese language and literature from global points of view. The Department of

English Language and Literature is intended to help students learn about the livelihoods, philosophies and cultures of English-speaking people through study of their language and literature. The Department of Chinese Language and Literature is aimed toward deepening students’ understanding of China through studying its society, art, culture, history and people, as well as its language, literature and philosophy. The Department of Foreign Languages concentrates on preparing students for careers and future opportunities to use English and at least one other foreign language. This faculty’s aim is to foster education for leading roles in the global community by sticking to language, which is the starting point of knowledge.

Faculty of Information and Communications

情報学部

Toward becoming an “information” specialist

Bunkyo University’s Faculty of Information and Communications created the field of comprehensive informatics in Japan when it was established in 1980 as the country’s first faculty of informatics. Students can study information and communication technologies (ICT)- as well as the related information in a multifaceted, comprehensive, and practical educational environment. They can also systematically master theories and techniques through the practical usage of information. This faculty consists of the Department of Information Systems, Department of Information Society, and Department of Media and Communications. In the Department of Information Systems, students learn

about information system development and digital content creation. In the Department of Information Society, students learn methods for creating businesses and utilizing IT to resolve challenges in today’s information society. In the Department of Media and Communications, students learn theories about communication and media expression techniques. The Faculty of Information and Communications offers conscientious education with small class sizes, via extensive support from faculty staff, spanning from fundamental learning in the first year to graduation research in the fourth. It also features a cutting-edge information environment that is conducive to learning.

Faculty of International Studies

国際学部

The Entrance to an international society

Planet Earth is like a global village where more than 7 billion people live. In the village, some of them are continuously glutting themselves with food, but others are struggling due to hunger and poverty. There are people who do not care about wasting energy, while some people are helping the cause not to spread environmental pollution. The Faculty of International Studies is designed to educate, train, and students’ abilities to act from a global perspective - taking action while thinking of ways to interact with a variety of people in the world. This faculty consists of two departments: the Department of International Understanding and the Department of International Tourism and Hospitality Management. The Department of

International Understanding helps raise students’ intercultural awareness and improve their communication ability. It also addresses international cooperation dealing with a variety of global issues. Social science is another area in this department. Areas of study in the Department of International Tourism and Hospitality Management include tourism, leisure, food industry, art and culture. Tourism and hospitality is a powerful measure for promoting intercultural exchange and understanding diverse values of the world. This department aims at equipping students with the ability to lead tourism and hospitality industries and cultural facilities from the viewpoint of citizens of a global community.

Faculty of Health and Nutrition

健康栄養学部

Toward nurturing body and spirit through nutrition

Degenerative chronic disease such as diabetes and dyslipidemia are increasing in Japan today. Therefore, the expertise of the dietitian is highly awaited. In response to such an expectation and need, the Department of licensed Dietitians in the Faculty of Health and Nutrition is focused on cultivating expert dietitians. In the years ahead, the main focus will be placed on prevention. Up until recently most registered dietitians have placed an emphasis on treating

those who are already suffering, such as diabetics. The job of the dietitian, whether registered or otherwise, is dealing with people up front. They strive to understand the psychology of the prospective patients in order to appropriately carry out their professional goals. “Taking care of physical and mental health” is what our faculty’s teaching philosophy is all about. We also collaborate with those disciplines with which we have interests in common.

Faculty of Business Administration

経営学部

Building an Ability to Accommodate the Real World

These days it is widely recognized that humans are not just a labor force but a source of creativity. Since humans are resources who grow companies and nations, we have been focusing on human resource development. Ordinary businesses in the world have been competing through cutting costs since the Industrial Revolution. However cost efficient management faces its limit because of diminishing marginal productivity. We aim to foster students with a talent for humanity to break through the current stagnating to the situation. We also believe humanity will be required in every single business scene. Our Faculty of Business Administration aims to encourage our students to build their knowledge of Economics, Accounting and Management with humanity.

Students will have face to face contact in small-sized lecture classes. We aim for a completely different mass production education system that will be effective in making good relationships between faculty members and students. We believe “a good relation” will lead to “a good result.” We provide the three courses of Business Administration, Public Service and Accounting, which students can adapt to their own goals. Furthermore, our program will enhance opportunities for our students to study and another world through our study abroad programs in Asia, the United States and Europe. We are now planning to carry out intensive trial classes for Economics, Finance, Accounting and Presentation development through an English-medium.

Special Postgraduate Course

Advanced Education Specialist Program

The special postgraduate course is a one-year program for college graduates based on the School Education Law. We have a limited enrollment number of 15 students and a minimum requirement of obtaining 30 credits while in this course. We focus on three kinds of abilities in order to acquire advanced and practical leadership: the ability of instructional design, the ability of classroom management, and the ability of problem-solving in an educational business field. Upon completion of this course, students acquire teaching credentials for elementary school equal a Master’s degree. For students who graduated from a four-year university with Secondary School Teaching Credentials for elementary school, they can audit classes in the undergraduate program for education majors to obtain Elementary School Teaching Credentials. The expert staff in elementary school education will assist students in honing their teaching ability, provide counseling on teaching practice throughout the program and after program completion. Many of our staff possess valuable experiences as elementary school educators, as principals or supervisors of school boards.

Foreign Student Department

The Foreign Student Department was established in April 1993 as a spin-off of a Japanese language course from the Institute of Language and Culture. This department is designed to educate and train foreign students, mainly from Asian countries, for a full year by offering Japanese language courses and helping them acquire basic knowledge about Japan. The purpose of training these students is to help them advance to higher educational institutions in Japan in the future, such as various faculties and graduate schools of Bunkyo University and other Japanese universities. Every year, some exchange students from New Zealand, Germany, China and South Korea take classes in the Foreign Student Department to acquire necessary skills as well. In addition, Japanese undergraduate students who want to teach Japanese language in the future learn knowledge and skills in this department. This course thus provides Japanese language and related curricula for foreign students for one year.

1 Our Mission

1. Education of Empathy for All Humanity

Empathy for all humanity is a belief in the absolute dignity of human nature and its unlimited potential for growth. Empathy for all humanity is belief, respect, warm affection, gentle compassion and development of all human beings. Bunkyo University puts into practice the education of empathy for all humanity. Education of empathy for all humanity stresses the importance of relationships between teaching staff and students, as well as between students and other students. Education of empathy for all humanity aims to carefully extend the individuality of each and every student, and to educate students with humanity. Through this education, our objective is to develop talented persons with trust in human beings and warm affection for all people.

2. Development of experts and talented persons with knowledge and training who are active in fields related to human beings

The education and research of Bunkyo University supports comprehensive academic fields which have been given the common keyword of "people." We develop experts and specialists with specialized knowledge and skills relating to issues directly connected to human beings and various problems facing modern society.

- The Faculty of Education targets education and research in various fields. The faculty aims to develop teachers, nursery teachers and similar professionals, who can be active in fields, such as schools, kindergartens and nurseries, as well as experts who will train others.
- The Faculty of Human Sciences targets education and research in psychology, welfare, society and culture, lifelong learning and more. Starting with specialists in these fields, the faculty develops talented persons with a wide range of knowledge and skills relating to human beings.
- The Faculty of Language and Literature targets education and research in the fields of language in which people are connected and in the fields of culture in which people are developed. The faculty develops specialists who can contribute to internationalization based on a comprehensive understanding of language and culture.
- The Faculty of Information and Communications targets education

and research in fields connected to information and human beings. The faculty develops specialists in the application of information focused on the perspective of people.

- The Faculty of International Studies targets education and research of the activities and business of people in a global society. The faculty cultivates talented persons with an international perspective and communication abilities, as well as those with the ability to take action.
- The Faculty of Health and Nutrition targets education and research in fields relating to health and nutrition. The faculty develops specialists of food and the mind, including administration nutritionists and nutrition teachers.
- The Faculty of Business Administration cultivates human resources who can contribute to the realization of better societies and the development of corporations and public organizations, focused on business administration that respects and utilizes people.

2 Features and Characteristics of the curriculum

1. Bunkyo University has organized a curriculum which has been given the objectives of extensive development of education and deepening of specialist fields.
2. The curriculum of Bunkyo University has been developed with a focus on interaction between teaching staff and students, as well as a focus on small group instruction, such as in seminars.
3. External and overseas training programs have been made available in each faculty. These have individuality appropriate to each area of study.

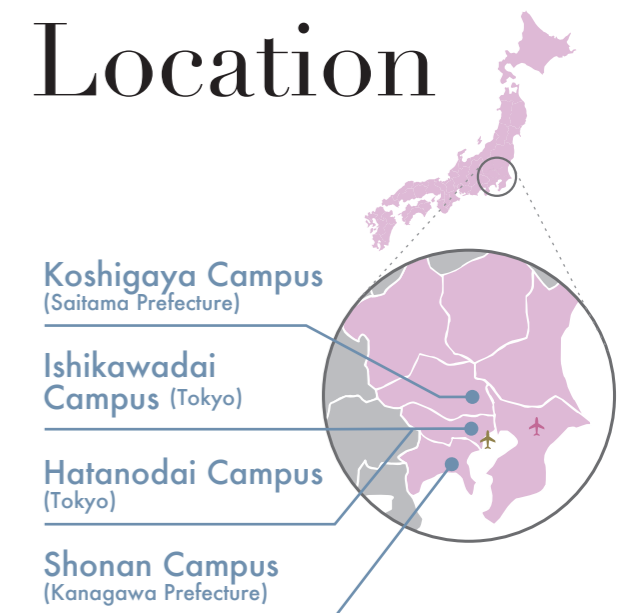

Graduate School of Human Sciences

人間科学研究科

The Graduate School of Human Sciences has two Master's programs - Clinical Psychology and Human Sciences. Students at this graduate school include those who have graduated from other universities, with academic emphasis placed on psychology, and those who have work experience at companies and other places in related fields. This graduate school provides students

with opportunity to study specialized academic field broadly. Upon program completion, students find jobs in various field such as schools and hospitals. They also enter the industrial community, with some of them becoming counselors and others clinical psychotherapists.

Graduate School of Language and Culture

言語文化研究科

The Graduate School of Language and Culture was established in response to requests from students who say they want to study more about languages and culture, which are the creative behaviors of humans, and also from students who want to acquire more language skills as a way to become language teachers in the future. The Language and Culture major is the only major with two specialties placed under it: second language and regional

language. Students at this graduate school study not only specialized subjects belonging to their own courses, but also part of specialized subjects belonging to the other course. This system is designed to enable students to broaden their educational and cultural levels and deepen their specialized knowledge.

Graduate School of Education

教育学研究科

This graduate school was established in April 2007. The main purpose is to improve professional teaching skills in curriculum guidance and problem-solving skills generally and practically through a dialogue education being conducted intensively in small groups. Our utmost concern is how to deal with various problems in school education and to conduct a wide variety of research of individuals, society at large and materials involved in the educational field. Specifically, theoretical and practical research in school

education is essential in closely cooperating with the local community on the basis of traditional psychology and pedagogy. The highest ranked qualification of an advanced teaching credential, followed by first and second teaching credential can be earned after completion of the course. In addition, students are qualified to be school psychotherapists based on field work.

Shonan Campus

Graduate School of Information and Communications

情報学研究科

The Graduate School of Information and Communications was established at Bunkyo University's Shonan campus in April of 2005, along with the Graduate School of International Studies. They are the Shonan campus's first two graduate schools. The Graduate School of Information and

Communications is aimed toward fostering human resources with professional expertise who have 1) knowledge about information systems, 2) the ability to use such knowledge in practical areas and 3) the ability to build an information system while meeting customer's demands and needs.

Graduate School of International Studies

国際学研究科

The Graduate School of International Studies, which was reorganized from 2015 has three courses: Development Studies, Studies for Civil Society & Regional Design and Tourism Studies. It provides students with both specialized and general education so as to help them become professionals with advanced knowledge in the modern global society. In the curriculum,

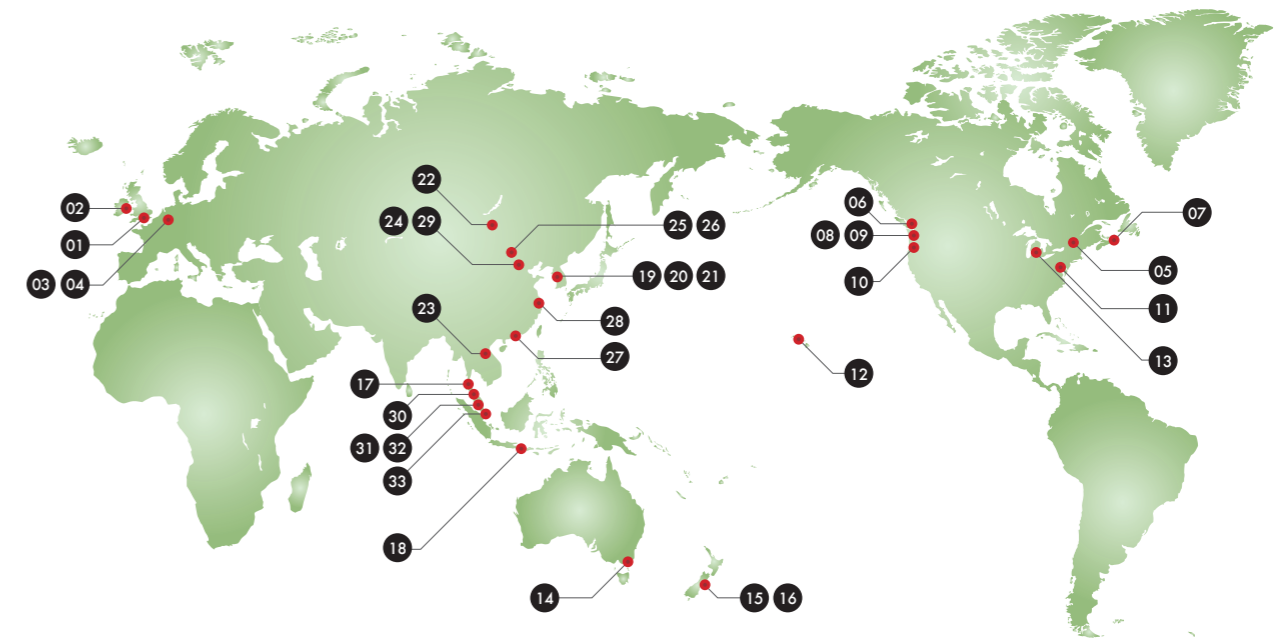
after students select a course, they are required to complete not only course-oriented specialized subjects but also the core and related subjects which are indispensable for their professional fields. Each subject is taught in small groups, thus, students learn and expand their research under close supervision from our faculty.
